



Joseph Valentich

Whereas: In 1974, autoharpists eager to convert chromatic autoharps to diatonic installed ungainly electric-base guitar and bandura strings, etc., to extend the autoharp's base range below Great f, for lack of an autoharp string thicker than .079 gauge. And,

Whereas: Joseph Valentich, a musician of the tamburitza and string maker for the same, advertised "All types of metal strings" in the Provember 1984 issue of "Arets" magazine. And,

Whereas: Of all eleven custom string makers listed in "Jirets" who autoharpist Charles Whitmer contacted about making a thicker, deeper autoharp string, only Joseph Valentich responded. And,

Whereas: From Movember 1984 through June 1986, Joseph Valentich applied his string making and engineering expertise to craft a copper-wound, .120-gauge "JVL" autoharp string, first installed by luthier George Orthey on Liberty Autoharp Humber 75 on Christmas Pay 1986, extending the GPA diatonic autoharp's bass range down to Great E. And,

Whereas: Joseph Valentich then collaborated with George Orthey to design complementary "3VM" (.102 gauge) and "3VS" (gauge unknown) autoharp strings. And,

Whereas: Upon retiring from string making in 2000, Joseph Valentich sold his autoharp-dedicated string machine to luthier Tom Fladmark, freeing the autoharp's bass range to deepen at will forever, for the benefit of the autoharp, its players and fans.

Therefore: Let it be resolved that Joseph Valentich be inducted with highest commendations as the 2023 posthumous member of The Autoharp Hall of Fame.

So it is proclaimed on this, the 8th day of June in the year Two Thousand and Twenty Three.
